

On Saturday, January 18 between sixty and seventy family, friends and neighbors of Viviana Moshouzte Fegezra and Jhony Capoena Sacama joined together in the sanctuary of La Iglesia Reformanda y Presbiteriana in Tamshiyacu, Peru for the Dedication of Jersey Valentina Mouhouzte! Pastors from all the churches listed above - fellow pastors in Tamshiyacu- joined in the service of enthusiastic singing, heart-felt prayers, scriptures readings, sermon - and then the Dedication. With joy Jersey's parents handed her to me - three weeks and two days old - and using words similar to our Baptismal Service, quickly translated into Spanish that afternoon, we Dedicated this precious child to God and prayed for God's continuing and generous blessings upon her and her family. All the Pastors joined the family in the front of the sanctuary and I prayed in English and at the same time all the Pastors prayed in Spanish - a chorus of voices praying in the Spirit of love and harmony.

And the celebration party which followed was filled with music and best wishes and cake and popcorn and orange juice and children playing and Viviana and Jhony beaming at the outpouring of love. In those moments the phrase "it takes a village" was demonstrated in all its fullness!

ell me an incredible story when the space between you and God was thin.

In that incredible moment...of being asked by your soul mate to get married, of hearing the news that you are having a baby, of sensing God's presence to hear a goodbye from a friend that died 20 years earlier, these are thin places. The breath between God and us is thin.

The Irish call these thin places. The veil between this world and the next is so sheer it is easy to step through.

Climbing in the mountains of Colorado leaves me breathless. Descending leaves me longing. Touring my family burial ground in Ireland allowed a connection that was inexplicably spiritlaced. Sustaining that is trickier.

The valleys are hard. Waiting for the engagement ring to appear for our hoped for 'happily ever after'—isn't as dark as the valley of living together in a pretend world. Waiting for a quadriplegic mother to die--is a dark valley far worse than the thin moment before she takes her last breath.

People lose sight of the mountain glimpse with God. It's human. We like the mountain high. We have our Peter, James, and John moments, and perhaps refer to them as once in a lifetime peaks that, like Charlie Brown, we don't think we will ever see again.

In a Peanuts comic strip, Lucy asks Charlie Brown. "Do you think that life has its peaks and valleys?" "Yes, I'm sure that it has," Charlie Brown says. "Then, that means that there must be one day above all others in each life that is the happiest, right?" asks Lucy.

"Yes, I guess that's probably true..."

"What if you have already had it?" Lucy asks, as Charlie Brown looks perplexed.

Could it be that the thin places are so plentiful that we don't recognize them as footprints of God but see them only as ordinary?

Thin places are ironic because there is no shortage.

In this Lenten Season, open your eyes to God's thin spaces all around you.

#### Conversation with Author Rev. Dr. Cliff Cain

Rev. Dr. Cliff Cain, Parish Associate and Theologian in Residence, First Presbyterian Church, will discuss his 10th book "*Attunement: Living in Harmony with Nature*" on Sunday, March 29th, at 10:30 am in the Church's Chapel, 324 Madison, Jefferson City, Mo. In addition, Cain will hold a question and answer session with the audience and be available to sign books. Copies can be purchased at the event.

Attunement examines four spiritual figures throughout history who were dedicated in their own way to living in a healthier relationship with nature and to modeling that attitude and behavior for others. The book features 12thcentury nun St. Hildegard of Bingen, St. Francis of Assisi, Pope Francis and 19th-century Japanese Buddhist monk Taigu Ryokan.

The writings of each individual emphasize that how we envision nature influences or determines how we interact with the natural world. "In order for life on earth to survive, we must alter dramatically the way we see our relationship with nature," Cain says.

The book, which Cain researched and wrote over a period of three years, is written more for a general audience than for academics. The person on the street and the religious person in the pew should be able to access and appreciate what he is attempting to convey.

"I am hoping the book will be helpful to persons of faith who believe, or could come to acknowledge, that the environment is a religious issue which the Church and public discourse must examine and embrace," Cain explains. "Indeed, in my opinion, a 'non-Green Christian' is a contradiction in terms. The Bible is replete with admonitions to care responsibly for the earth which God has created and placed in our hands."

In addition to his role at First Presbyterian Church, Cain is the Harrod-C.S. Lewis Professor of Religious Studies at Westminster College. He teaches courses at Westminster in world religions, religion and ecology, contemporary religious thought, religion and science, death and dying, the meaning of life and Holocaust studies. Missouri Governor Mike Parson appointed him to the state-wide Holocaust Education Awareness Commission in the fall of

#### Head of Staff/Moderator's Report

- A motion was made and approved to create an ad hoc Security Committee with two volunteer congregants to co-lead (Jay Bosch and Nick Lepper).
- The moderator requested that Session members consider those members that they had not seen in worship for six months, and reflect on the ways that we might communicate with these members and encourage their regular return to worship.

On March 26th the Poor People's Campaign will be holding a "Mass Meeting" in Springfield, Missouri, with its national co-chairs, Presbyterian Minister Rev. Dr. Liz Theoharis and Disciples of Christ minister, Rev. Dr. William J. Barber II. Launched in 2018, the Poor People's Campaign was conceived as an effort to revive the original Poor People's Campaign of Dr. Martin Luther King back in 1968 and to continue the work towards ending the interlocking injustices of systemic racism, poverty, ecological devastation, the war economy/militarism and the distorted moral narrative of religious nationalism. Some may recall the Campaign's "40 Days of Action" in the summer of 2018, during which there were weekly marches and rallies in Jefferson City and other state capital cities. This year's efforts will culminate in a Mass Poor People's Assembly and Moral March on Washington, D.C. in June.

Dr. William Barber and other speakers on these important issues and the need to revive the morals of our country to combat poverty and other injustices. Dear Dave and Mission Committee, Many thanks for your email and your faith family's financial support. Just today did my brother in Toronto inform me that the cheque which you sent arrived in his mailbox in Toronto. It is a most timely gift as just last week did the kindergarten for Roma children in the Nagydobrony south encampment run out of firewood. As it was the kindergarten was not operating for the last two weeks because the state health authorities had closed all schools and kindergartens because of the large number of children who had contracted influenza [although many of us suspect this is just a ploy for the state to save on school heating costs]. With your support we shall now be able to purchase enough firewood for this kindergarten to last until the warmer weather comes [which may well happen sooner than expected seeing how very mild this "winter" has been thus far].

Our family spent five days of the Christmas period in my wife's home village in Transylvania [presently part of Rumania].

#### CHURCH OF CENTRAL AFRICA PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD OF LIVINGSTONIA

#### **Report on the Utilization of Funds**

#### Background

In the month of December & January, the CCAP Health Coordination Office received funding from the 1st Presbyterian Church of Warrensburg and the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. This money has been utilized jointly to meet the operational needs of the office.

#### **Introduction**

The CCAP Synod of Livingstonia promotes and provides health services to 4 of the 6 districts in Northern Malawi. The work is done in both the semi urban and rural areas but the majority being in the rural and hard to reach areas of the North.

#### Areas visited

1. Community Based Distributing Agents (CBDAs) In January, the Coordination Office visited the communities where the Community volunteers are providing family planning methods to people in the villages. This started way back in 1992 in order to reduce the distances of people traveling to the hospitals. The Department through its hospitals trains Community Volunteers so that they can be going door to door within the reach of their villages to educate and provide these family planning methods. This initiative has increased the uptake of family planning and also reduced the number of unplanned pregnancies. The Synod of Livingstonia was the first to initiate this approach and it was later adopted by the Malawi government.

During this visit to the community, the Synod Health Director and her team went to see the progress of the work and also to appreciate the challenges the volunteers are facing. It was noted that there is much progress and many people are accessing the family planning methods. The one success is that there are male, female and young CBDAs and it has become easy when each of the groups wants to access family planning they are able to approach their peers. The visit this time was done at Dunduzu community.

#### 2. Youth Groups

The young people are an important cadre in Malawi as the country is youthful. Young people are performing many activities to disseminate messages of health. They meet as youths to share messages regarding HIV & AIDS, sexual reproductive health and education.

These are done through drama, debate, songs, sports and poems, etc. The visit was done at Euthini and we met the youths at the church and school. The youths portrayed their work and activities in various ways. The youths were encouraged and also lessons were given on various ways. The young people have been very active in reaching out to other youths so that messages can be spread. The one positive thing at Euthini is that the church as also organized itself to help the youths spiritually through the Pastors fraternal. They are also paying school fees for the needy youths who are in the youth clubs. The teachers are taking a very active role in being with the children. The reports are showing that because of the youth clubs, there is a reduction of child marriages, unplanned pregnancies and criminal abortions.

#### Purchase of medications and supplies

Almost all supplies and medications are in short supply in our hospitals. The hospitals struggle to make ends meet and meet the needs of the patients and clients.

#### Hospital visits


Nurses and clinicians are monitored in their work and support is also given where need be. In the month of December visits were made to Ekwendeni hospital to deal with disciplinary issues with management as well as to monitor patient care.

#### Car insurance

The 2019 vehicle insurance had not been paid, with the coming in of the two chunks of money; we managed to make a part payment of the insurance to make the car road worthy. We are grateful that our insurers managed to provide us with an insurance disc despite not paying the full amount.

#### Staff emoluments

The Coordination Office staffs are lagging behind in receiving their salaries due to lack of funding. At receipt of the money, some staffs have been covered to receive all their arrears except the Synod Health Director who is still having two months of her 6 months unpaid salaries. This has put a smile and also encouraged staff in this difficult month where there is great demands in the payment of school fees, food is scarce and prices are high, purchase of fertilizers, etc. We are grateful ©©.
