One idea has already been chosen – the theme for the season this year is **KNOWING JESUS MAKES A DIFFERENCE.** 



All the batteries have been taken to Batteries Plus at 1922 Missouri Blvd. Thanks to everyone who has remembered to dispose of batteries in a way that protects the environment! For your information, besides free recycling of batteries, Batteries Plus also accepts lightbulbs for recycling, including CFC, LED, fluorescents etc). There is no charge except for 4ft fluorescent tubes. You can drop them off yourself or check with Vicki Schildmeyer or another member of the Social Justice Ministry Team. Keep up the great work!

Bill Zimmerman, a volunteer with the Farmer-to-Farmer (F2F) program will offer a fascinating program at First Presbyterian on Thursday, February 13, at 6:30 pm in Knox Hall. F2F supports farmers and agribusiness professionals in developing countries to improve their livelihoods and food security. F2F sends US based volunteers on technical assignments to provide hands-on training to communities, cooperatives, agribusinesses, and educational institutions.

Bill is an agricultural and environmental microbiologist from Jefferson City. Since he began volunteering with F2F in 2014, he has accepted 45 assignments in 23 countries, including Malawi. In fact, scheduling Bill to speak is difficult because he is so frequently out of the country on an assignment. He works directly with one of the implementers of the program funding, National Cooperative Business Alliance (CLUSA is their developmental arm). A few weeks ago, he was named the CLUSA volunteer of the year. He loves working with the local farmers to discover their needs and find ways to improve their production, and he does it all with humility and respect.

**On Saturday, February 22**, our church will be hosting delegates (elders and ministers) from Presbyterian churches across central Missouri for their first gathering of 2025.

This is a great opportunity to hear and see directly what is going on in other churches in our areas.

The Moderator for the meeting is the Rev. Rick Watson, the pastor at Vandalia Presbyterian Church. He completed his degrees from Dubuque Presbyterian Seminary in Iowa and has wonderful credentials as a preacher, pastor, and administrator. He does all this as a person who is blind, using the skills of braille, listening well, and always living with a heart of love. The preacher for worship is another new minister in our midst, Rev. Kati Collins, who is the new senior pastor at First Presbyterian, Columbia. She is a graduate of Columbia Presbyterian Seminary in Decatur, GA. She and her husband Robbie have preschool daughters, Abigail and Samantha. She brings a deep educational and mission orientation, having served in various churches, including two years in a church in the Czech Republic.

Other pastors and elders are as interesting as these two and as hosts for this event, you have the opportunity to meet and learn and broaden your horizons with individuals and by seeing how the business of the wider church is conducted.

The meeting begins at 10am and is over by 3pm. Worship takes place at 11:00 before lunch at Noon. You can come and go at any times and join in the meeting which will be happening in our Sanctuary.

# Did You Know & What Can You Do? From Social Justice Ministry Team

The recent ongoing wildfires in California have had a devastating impact on people, animals, and habitat. The blame game is ongoing and will continue. There wasn't enough water, the politicians were all to blame, the pressure in hydrants was insufficient. Too little is heard about climate change and another culprit – the prevalence of invasive species. Our planet evolved in ways that made each specific ecosystem ideal for that particular place and climate. Non-native plants disrupt and can have negative impacts on local ecosystems.

Southern California's landscape is dominated by chaparral with perennial native grasses that maintained moisture and helped prevent the spread of fire. In the 1700s, European settlers brought nonnative grasses which soon outcompeted native species. These annuals die each year, leaving behind a dense layer of dead vegetation that is highly vulnerable to fire, acting like a wick to carry the fire into the shrub land.

In Missouri, we don't worry much about wildfires, but even here we should consider the benefits of landscaping with native plants and trying to rid our yards and public spaces of highly invasive plants, such as Japanese honeysuckle. Native plants are more resilient, provide food and shelter for local wildlife, are easy to maintain, improve air quality, and reduce the amount of chemicals you need to use. Consider adding natives to your yard. You can also contact Parks and Recreation or your city council representative and express your support for planting natives in our parks and public areas.
